# **Goals and Objectives**

### **Course Description**

"Assessing Motion, Strength, & Balance" is an online recorded video of a previously presented live CE webinar for physical therapists and physical therapist assistants. This course examines standard tests and measures utilized to assess patient progress toward therapeutic goals and analyze the effectiveness of interventions performed during research trials. Current research related to equipment including smartphone applications and hand-held dynamometry, technique, and reliability of data collected through goniometry, manual muscle testing, and balance assessment tools is explored.

### **Course Rationale**

The purpose of this course is to provide a comparative analysis of traditional and contemporary techniques for assessment of range of motion, muscle strength, and balance based on current research to aid the clinician in employing these techniques effectively when assessing patient progress.

# Altering Test Position

- When performing isokinetic strength assessment for sport participation, consider testing at joint angles that replicate specific activity demands.
   Example: Testing for quad hamstring ratio at a
- greater hip flexion angle alters length tension relationship and peak torque generation of hamstrings.
  - Maybe better predictor of potential injury in sprinters.

 Larger muscle groups require additional force to achieve same muscle grade as smaller

 Application of force variable among testers.
 Ceiling effect of maximum MMT grade does not account for functional strength
