 Transverse plane Difficult to directly observe in clinical analysis Can use symmetry of arm swing, pelvic rotation, and heel height to infer

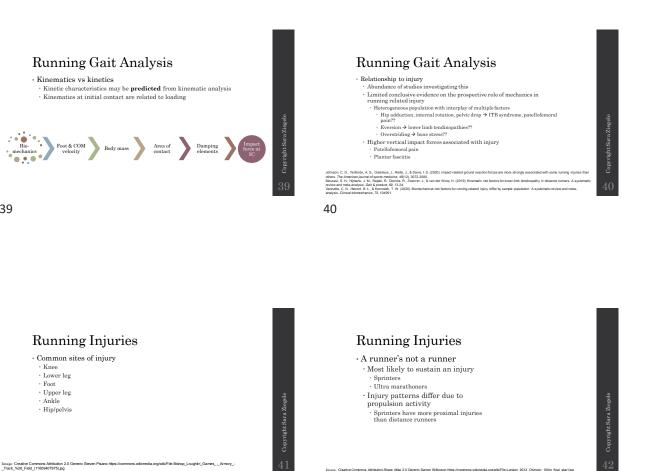

- Case Example
   20 year old female
   Division I college cross country runner
   Pain in right shin began 1.5 years ago
   Division I college cross modeling physician Evaluated by sports medicine physician through university and second opinion at home Radiographs, MRI: confirmed initial tibial stress reaction stress reaction Bone density scan: normal results Consulted with dietetics Sat out the remainder of the season Completed physical therapy including strength, flexibility, and balance
  - Switched shoes to more cushion
     Pain improved over the off season

# Bone Stress Injury - Tibia

#### • Case Example, cont'd

- Resumed training with the team the following season upon completion of a return to running program
   Symptoms came back early in the season
  - Returned to physical therapy
- Switched to cross training to avoid impact
   Once symptoms resolved, initiated a very slow return to running
- program
- Tibial pain returned
   Decision made to red shirt the season
- · Referred to running specialist physical therapist

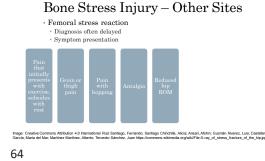
# Bone Stress Injury – Tibia

· Case Example, cont'd

- Runner's clinic evaluation Strength: 5/5 hip ABD and extension Core: 5/5 lower abdominals
- Postural alignment: neutral through hips, knees, ankle
   Gait analysis: increased distance COM to IC, decreased knee ext at IC, increased DF at IC
- Program recommendation
   Gait retraining
   Increased cadence by 10% with auditory cueing

- Very gradual interval treadmill program
   Desensitization
   Resumed training with team for beginning of season · Successfully completed season without pain
