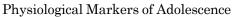

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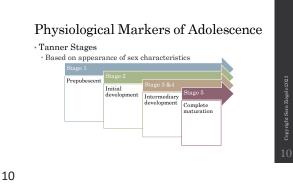

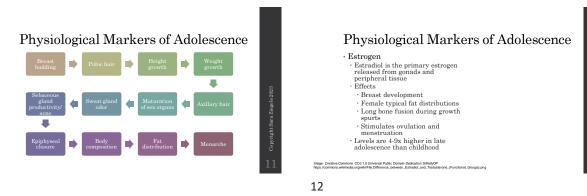

Cardiovascular output

- Absolute maximal oxygen uptake (mL/ min) Increases linearly with age from 7 years through 13-14 y/o in untrained girls, then declines slightly
- · Aerobic power responds positively to training
- Absolute and relative maximal oxygen uptakes improve with training at all ages
 Difference between trained and untrained girls is greatest during adolescence Increase in adipose tissue following sexual maturation of girls likely contributes to the sex difference in aerobic power per unit of body weight

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Variations in Physical Performance

ACSM activity guidelines:

 Girl's physical activity tends to decrease significantly compared to boys
 Disparity persists into adulthood

 May need additional support and encouragement to remain active

 Structured programs: lifting weights, resistance bands, body weight

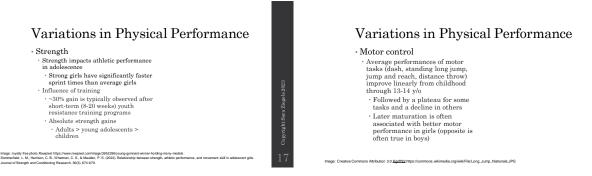

 Cessation of regular menses for 3 mo or cessation of irregular menses for 6 mo

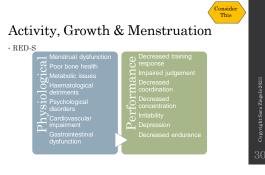
Irregular menstrual cycles >35 days apart, in adolescents may be extended to include cycles longer than 45 days until 2-3 years after menarche

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Physiological Changes in Pregnancy

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Physiological Changes in Pregnancy

- Hemodynamic changes Create circulatory reserve
- Sustain the pregnant woman and fetus at rest and during exercise
- Soft tissue edema in 80% of women
- Cardiovascular adaptations
- Blood volume Systemic • Heart rate vascular resistance • Stroke volume Cardiac output

Physiological Changes in Pregnancy

Pulmonary Increased minute volume by 50%, due to increased tidal volume 44

10-30 beats per minute increase from baseline during or after exercise
Minimal to no difference in baby birth weight
Women who continue vigorous exercise into third trimester may have 200-400g smaller baby, aithough no increase of fetal growth restriction

· Should pregnant women be exercising??

· Physical inactivity and excessive weight gain are independent risk factors for maternal obesity and related pregnancy complications · Including gestational diabetes mellitus

 Sleeping: pillow between knees

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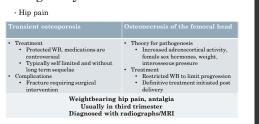
Musculoskeletal Disorders in Pregnancy · Low Back Pain, cont'd

- Strengthening of the abdominal and back muscles Example exercises for lumbopelvic
- mobility and stabilization in pregnancy
- · Cat cow/bird dogs
- · Standing lateral/fwd reach
- · Lower trunk rotation stretch
- · Piriformis stretch in sitting
- · Pelvic tilt in sitting and standing
- Clamshells

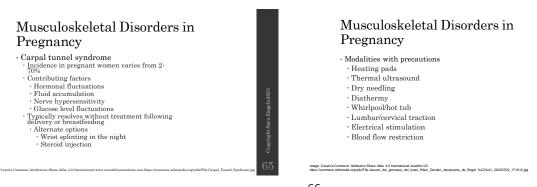
- Clinical practice guidelines: "Conflicting evidence was found for interventions including the use of support belts, and exercise. The evidence for manual therapy can best be described as weak/emergent at this time." · Example exercises in pregnancy:
- · Isometrics: Hip adductors and abductors

Musculoskeletal Disorders in Pregnancy

- Falls/balance dysfunction Postural stability unchanged in first trimester
- Postural balance significantly decreased in second and third trimester, as well as postpartum (6-8 weeks)
- · 25-27% of pregnant women fall
- Higher fall rate in sedentary women than physical exercise
- · Modifications to activities

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Postpartum

- Abdominal muscle recovery • Structural changes (DRA, mm lengthening) and functional deficits persisted at 6 months postpartum • Partial recovery of DRA happens
- Partial recovery of DRA happens after childbirth but is incomplete even after 1 year
 Postpartum women showed poorer trunk strength than nulliparous women at 6 months
- 12 (40%) of the 30 postpartum women given a grade of 3/5 or less Postpartum women (up to 6 months) had greater fatigability of the lumbopelvic stabilizing muscles and lower physical function than nulligravid women

 Scar management

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 Peripheral joint laxity does not return to normal range within 6 weeks

Cardiovascular expectations · VO2 max: if athlete continues moderate intensity exercise during gestation, she can expect VO2 max to return to pre-pregnancy levels after delivery

 Longer timeline for abdominal muscle recovery?
 Some pilot study research has been done in Journal of Women's Health Physical Therapy, but more is needed

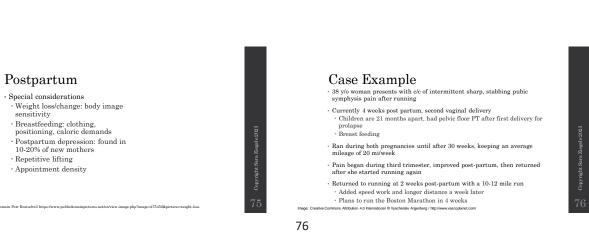
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Postpartum

- · Pelvic floor tips for the non-pelvic floor PT
- Pelvic floor is part of your core Draw in pelvic floor (Kegel squeeze) during abdominal stabilization Inability to maintain a pelvic floor contraction \rightarrow
- incontinence
- Avoid holding breath
- Avoid noiding breath Increases intra abdominal pressure and can cause incontinence Progress from supine to functional positions
- Indications for pelvic floor evaluation:
 Unable to perform isolated pf contraction
- Exercise is severely limited by urinary incontinence
- Pelvic pain/pressure during activity

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Postpartum

· Diastasis recti abdominis

Pain presentation: upper, middle or lower low back • Depends on where abdominal support is lacking Difficulty and weakness with rotation against resistance Recent studies challenge the conventional mindset of closing the gap

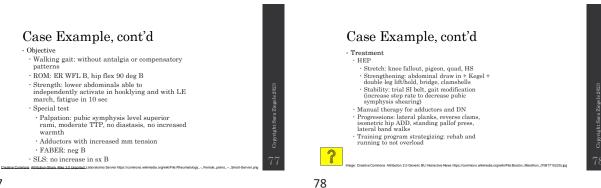
Allows forces to cross midline
 Pulls it wider BUT it also reduces the distortion

↓ Midline doming or sagging
 Abdomen appears flatter

TrA pulls on the sheaths of the recti muscles and then the linea alba

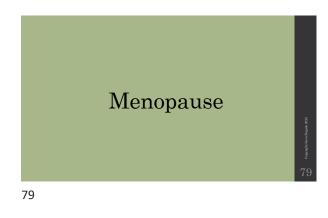
"The goal is not to reduce the gap after all – it is to widen it, load it, and hold the abdominal contents in!"

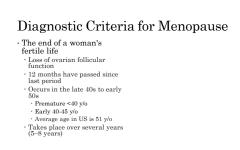

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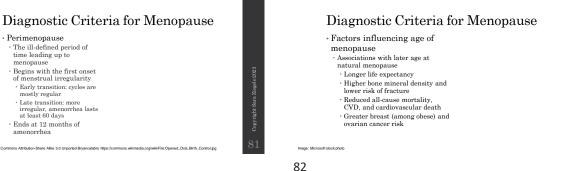
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 Perimenopause • The ill-defined period of time leading up to

menopause Begins with the first onset

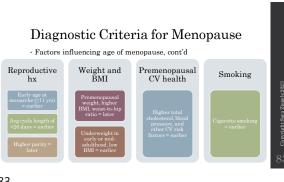

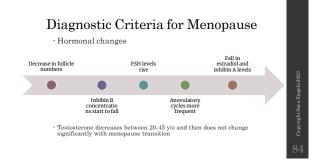
Early transition: cycles are mostly regular

Late transition: more irregular, amenorrhea lasts at least 60 days

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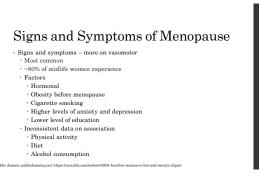

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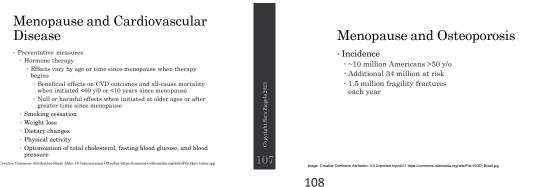




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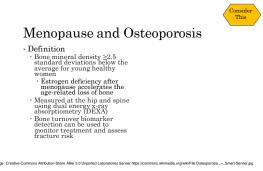
Menopause and Cardiovascular Disease Paracardial fat volumes are higher after menopause Potential influence of estradiol or hormone therapy Increased lipids (LDL-C and apolipoprotein B), metabolic syndrome risk, and vascular remodeling Driven by perimenopause > aging. Increased blood pressure, insulin, and glucose more influenced by aging Reversal in the associations of HDL-C with CVD risk during perimenopause. Higher HDL-C levels may not consistently reflect good CV health in midlife women



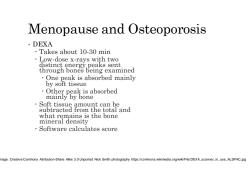


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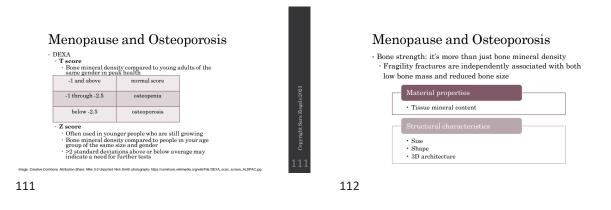
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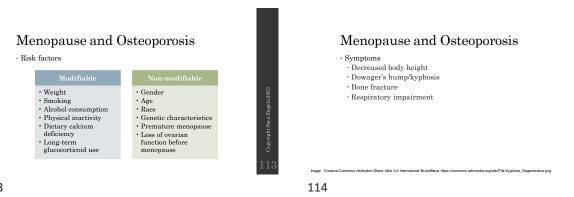

Exercise considerations

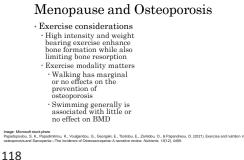
- Bone Health & Osteoporosis Foundation recommendations
- High or low impact weight-bearing
 Jumping, jogging and aerobics as high impact exercise

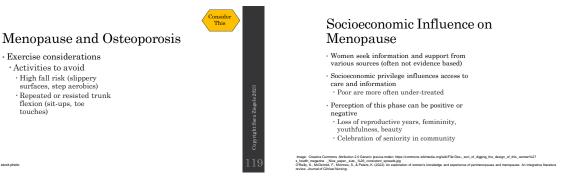
- Walking and step aerobics as lower impact exercises
- Muscle strengthening exercises
 Lifting weights

- Elastic exercise bands
 Exercises including resistance against gravity

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Case Example

- 65 y/o woman
- · Presents to clinic with 3-week hx of R lateral hip and leg pain
- · Began after initiating new exercise routine
- Non-impact resistance training guided by personal trainer
- · No acute MOI, rather soreness post-exercise that "resolved everywhere else but the hip"
- · Provoking factors: walking, stairs
- Pain 8/10 at worst, 3/10 current
- Medical hx: glute med/min repair for complete tear on the contralateral side 3 years prior

Case Example, cont'd

Objective

- Posture: no significant deviations · Gait: ambulates without antalgia, no Trendelenberg or
- ensated Trendelenberg romn · ROM
- · Hip: flex, IR, ER symmetrical and WFL B
- Knee: lacking full ext L
- · Strength
- Hip ABD: able to perform independent AROM anti-gravity through full range, mild pain reported
- · SLS: able to perform B without deviation
- · DL squat: mild weight shift towards LLE
- Palpation: no atrophy notable through R hip/glutes, pain just proximal to gr trochanter, taut band in posterolateral glutes

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Case Example, cont'd

- · Signs and sx consistent with gluteal tendinopathy
- Initial treatment
 - HEP: glute isometrics (standing at wall and on the floor), self release using dryer ball for ${\rm TrP}$
- · Manual therapy: IASTM to ITB, STM to lateral glutes
- · Review of gym program

Follow up

- · Visit 2: significant reduction in pain from baseline · Postural education on neutral hip to reduce shearing (standing clamshell, fwd step-up)
- · Visit 3: returned to more activities without return of sx (d/c from care) Progression of strengthening (clamshells, bridge progression, lateral plank)

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Conclusion

 Women have unique physiologic considerations for exercise across the lifespan. By widening our understanding of these distinctive characteristics, we can better educate our patients, improve female health, and provide more effective care.
