HF Exercise Adherence

- Exercise is safe and effective for patients who are able to participate.
- Emphasize patient self-assessment of Heart Failure Zones.
- Increasing exercise capacity should translate to improved overall daily physical activity to break the negative cycle of deconditioning.
- Include psychosocial components.

Intra-aortic Balloon Pump (IABP)

Balloon placed in aorta supports patients in cardiogenic shock or at risk of hemodynamic

Mechanical device designed to assist the native heart by providing hemodynamic support to under perfused organs.
The device is implanted in parallel with the heart, taking over the majority of its circulatory function.
Indicated as bridge to recovery, bridge to transplant, or destination therapy.
